Take control of your destiny: three steps to go for it!

The theme of our International President, Alfred Herzing, for this year, "Take control of your destiny," could seem difficult to put into practice. Easier said than done! Why?



When I ask people to list reasons why we hold back and stop short of reaching our goals, the reasons usually involve fear - fear of failure, fear of success, fear of rejection, fear of not being good enough, fear of looking foolish. Here are three steps you can take to overcome your fears and thereby take control of your destiny.

1. Believe in yourself.

There is no one else on earth like you. You have a unique perspective that we need to hear. We can learn something from you. We're all teachers and we're all students. Use positive self-talk. "I am," are the two most powerful words, in any language. Whatever adjectives we follow those two words with when describing ourselves will determine who and what we are. If you say, "I am afraid," you will be afraid. If you say, "I am courageous," you will be courageous. Act successful, and you will be courageous.

2. Have faith in others.

Most people tend to worry too much about what other people think of them. It's your life; it doesn't matter what others think you should be, should do, or should have done. 3. Take action.

"Outside of nature, nothing happens on its own," said Alfred Herzing in the Toastmaster magazine. You have the ideas, now is time to build the plan and take action. The time is now because all we have is now. If you let this time pass you by, you will never have it again. Numerous opportunities lie ahead of us. It all starts with us: when we take action, we take control of our destiny.

Imaginez : plus de 2000 Toastmasters accourus du monde entier, réunis dans un hôtel superbe offrant deux salles gigantesques de 3000 mètres carrés, bien entendu modulables, séparées par un foyer spacieux et une galerie - promenoir aérée, où personne ne se bouscule, le tout dans une organisation et une ponctualité sans défaut.

Imaginez : le mardi soir, le concours inter - districts, au cours duquel s'affrontent les meilleurs orateurs des districts extérieurs à l'Amérique du Nord (USA et Canada). Nous aurons le droit d'y participer lorsque nous serons débarrassés de P (pour provisoire), c'est-à-dire lorsque nous aurons atteint les 60 clubs (8 de plus qu'aujourd'hui seulement !). Le vainqueur est en chaise roulante, et son discours plein d'optimisme et de fougue nous a tous galvanisés.

Imaginez, en préambule à l'ouverture des travaux, l'arrivée en grande pompe, du fond de l'immense salle, de cent drapeaux représentant cent pays, dans un roulement de tambours, et votre servante, pourtant pas particulièrement patriote, serrant avec bonheur la hampe de notre drapeau national, pas peu fière d'aller l'installer en fond de scène, sous les sunlights... et les applaudissements !

Imaginez des ateliers et des sessions éducatives à profusion, conduits par les tout meilleurs, notamment le gagnant du concours international de discours de l'an dernier, Ed Tate, qui nous a raconté l'investissement qu'a représenté pour lui ce défi et nous a gratifiés, d'une traite, des trois discours gagnants qu'il a prononcés successivement aux niveaux de son district, de sa région, pour finir en beauté à la Convention annuelle. Epoustouffant !

Imaginez le Golden Gavel Luncheon, un déjeuner de gala, au cours duquel notre District Governor 2000-2001 Dirk Husfeld et son épouse Luciana étaient à table sur scène, oui oui, sur scène, parmi les tout meilleurs, car notre District 59 s'est distingué par ses résultats en étant 7^{ème} sur 77, alors que nous sommes affligés du P pour provisoire, n'ayant pas encore atteint les 60 clubs requis ! C'est dire si l'avenir est à nous...

Imaginez le Hall of Fame, où trois heures durant (je vous l'avoue, c'est un peu longuet !) tous les Toastmasters présents vont applaudir à tout rompre les résultats reconnus par Toastmasters International, qu'il s'agisse d'individus, de clubs ou de districts qui se sont particulièrement distingués au cours de

l'année passée. Nous étions neuf pour représenter notre District, Select Distinguished cette année : nous sommes bravement montés tous les neufs sur la scène car c'était la toute première fois que l'Europe était représentée de façon visible à la Convention Internationale annuelle, et pour un coup d'éclat, c'était un coup de maître qu'il fallait marquer dignement ! L'an prochain, nous avons la volonté de monter d'un cran dans le classement, pour faire partie des six premiers, les President Distinguished Districts, la crème de la crème !

Toastmasters International est unanimement reconnu aux Etats-Unis et dans d'autres pays du monde comme un efficace moyen de progresser, grâce à des méthodes éprouvées et à une organisation très au point. Il ne tient qu'à nous qu'un jour il en soit de même en France ; pour cela, la première chose à faire est de nous développer en créant des clubs, de façon à pouvoir offrir la possibilité de progresser à tous ceux qui le souhaitent, quel que soit leur lieu de résidence ou de travail.

Alain Pétillet, le gouverneur de notre District 59P 2001-2002 a choisi comme devise « Together we achieve », en français « Ensemble, nous réussissons » ; je vous invite tous à faire vôtre cette devise, afin que les clubs existants croissent en nombre de membres et que l'année en cours voie se créer de nouveaux clubs francophones : on peut rêver du jour où nous aurons un district européen francophone (60 clubs) qui nous permettrait de tenir des concours de District en français...

Alors, haut les cœurs ! Lançons-nous avec enthousiasme dans les campagnes de recrutement !

Competent Leader

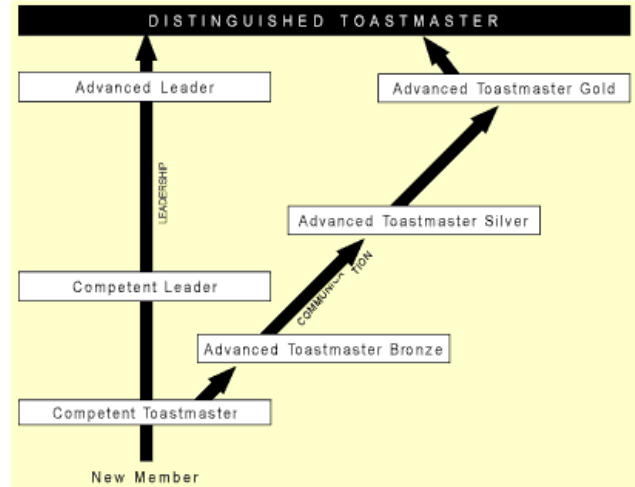
Once you have achieved your CTM, you are eligible to apply for the Competent Leader award. To start with the preparation of the application you need not achieved your CTM. You can work in parallel without any problem. And believe me, I know many people who do so. What do you have to do for your application? Five steps are necessary:

- (1) Achieve your CTM (already explained)
- (2) Serve at least six months as a Club officer (President, Vice President Education, Vice President Membership, Vice President Public Relations, Secretary, Treasurer, or Sergeant at Arms)
- (3) Participate in the preparation of a Club Success Plan -> That is quite an important issue!!! If you haven't yet been involved, ask your current president about it. If she/he does not know ask your VP Education. If she/he does not know either, ask your Area Governor. If you do not know who your Area Governor is, please do not hesitate to contact me. I will help you!!! PROMISED. To make the explanation short here: normally the president brings the board of officers together and they all prepare a Club Success Plan together.
- (4) While a Club officer, participate in a district-sponsored Club-officer training program. (Probably you have done so already. If not, you have a chance to attend training during the next training period (Dec-Jan-Feb)). If you have any questions

concerning the training, please contact your Area Governor (or if you do not know who it is, please ask me).

(5) Conduct any two programs from the Successful Club Series. These programs are small presentations, which are already prepared by TMI. The presentations are easy to do and the content might be interesting to you as well as to your club members. The small manuals together with some overhead transparencies can be ordered from TMI. If you have any questions concerning the manuals please ask your VP Education or, if you need further help, just ask me.
